### **CHATTANOOGA**

#### THE FIGHTIN 311 + MOVES SOUTH

We left General Chesty and his fledgling band of Marines in Philadelphia securing the area and providing back up for General George and his Continentals but it was time to move on. Hayes volunteered to shinny up the tree and hang the flag. One of the men was heard to remark "Wish we had a picture of that."

Another problem was feeding the troops. Chief Ross told Chesty that his cooks couldn't keep up with the market so Chesty suggested he put on a second shift. They could only find one cook in the whole village that was willing to work the night shift for time and a half. Her name was Little Debbie and she cooked really good pastries. Because she worked at night the Marines called her pastries "Moon Pies" which became a staple for the region and continues to this day.

So General Chesty and his Marines settled in once again to occupational duty on the Tennessee River. One day Chesty was bathing in the river and riders approached and he recognized the Congressman that he had met on their trip down. Crockett said he and his band of Tennesseans were bound for Texas to back up Col. Travis. Seems the Texicans were outnumbered 500-1 and they were going to even up the sides and asked Chesty to ride along. This was Chesty's kind of fight and what his Marines were trained for but said he couldn't

make a move without orders from General George but said he'd put in for orders and follow west when he could.

One day General Chesty was sitting out on the patio of Little Debbie's pastry shop sipping a local brew when he noticed Lt. Yunck running around the field pulling a contraption with a string. The thing would go up in the air and make a couple loops and crash back to earth. "What is that thing?" asked Chesty. "I don't know," replied the Lieutenant, "something the Cherokee kids were playing with. They call it an "air wing" but it doesn't stay up in the air very long.
